What is your #1 tip or advice for the beginning plein air painter?

Squint your eyes to simplify shapes and eliminate details. Paint the large abstract shapes before getting into details.

If you could only have 5 colors on your palette, what would they be?

Cad Yellow, cad red, cobalt blue, titanium white, black

Why do you choose to paint outside in the wild plein air rather than in the controlled environment of the studio?

In the great outdoors, beyond the benefit of direct experience of wondrous nature, one can see myriad of colors and experience the light's innumerable states, which give life to paintings. One can also achieve immediacy of brushwork that is difficult to do in the studio.

What was your most hair-raising extreme plein air painting experience?

Few months ago, I was painting on a steep cliff side above a river in northern California, got stung by a wasp on the hand that held my brush, it made me loose my footing and I came very close to falling off the cliff. Another was in Barcelona, Spain when three policemen tried to stop me and five painter friends from painting in a public plaza; there is a great YouTube video of this incident by Scott Burdick, "Just Say No to Art".
